Synopsis:

On her deathbed, Christiane's mother apologizes to her, then utters a street address in Heidelberg. Christiane has only hazy memories of her early childhood in Germany, which she and her mother never discussed after arriving in New York after the war. She knows only that her father, a German soldier, was killed during Hitler's invasion of Poland. Her mother's last words set Christiane on a search for her identity, leading her back to Heidelberg, and to a shocking confrontation with the truth.

Playwright's Statement:

Interweaving theater and chamber music, this piece explores one woman's experience of the impact of secrets and hidden pain born of collective, socio-historical trauma. As we accompany Christiane on her journey, we glimpse the ways in which repression of historical truth can weave into the self—and the redemptive power of reckoning with the past.

He has also worked directly with numerous composers including Osvaldo Golijov, Thomas Adès, David Bruce, Ricky Ian Gordon, Christopher Rouse, Mason Bates, Ned Rorem, and George Tsontakis. His Broadway credits include *South Pacific, The King & I, Les Misérables, Sunset Boulevard, My Fair Lady* and currently, *Sweeney Todd*.
